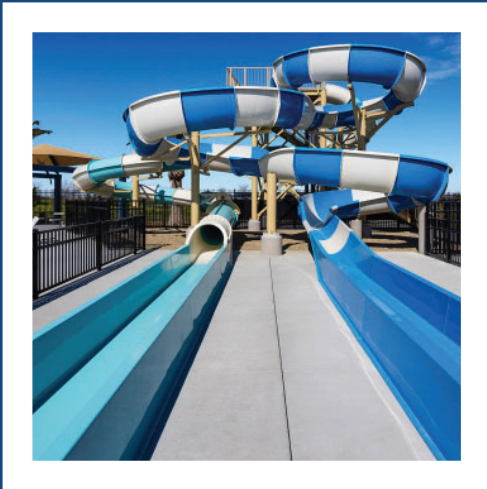
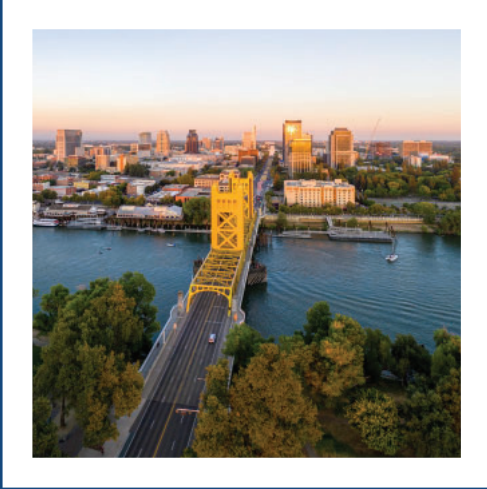

YPCE NEWS

Catch up on Youth, Parks, and Community Enrichment news:

YPCE recently won a California Park and Recreation Society Award of Excellence for Marketing and Communication for the Parks Plan 2040 youth outreach program. This award recognizes excellence in print, audio visual or electronic communications. The Award of Excellence showcased YPCE's youth outreach plan to improve community engagement through an art contest, so that the youngest residents of Sacramento have a voice in how parks and recreation develop over the next 20 years. Special thanks to YPCE's Youth Division, all speaker series participants, and all art contest participants! More information can be found on the 2040 website.

The Parks Plan team published a statistical survey of 600 residents, conducted by EMC Research, which asked the community about their needs and desires of the City's Parks Plan 2040. The survey results were supportive of the direction of the Parks Plan 2040. Importantly, residents have an overwhelmingly positive view of city parks, recreation, and youth programs, with 90% rating parks and recreation as important to the overall quality of life. Most residents prefer equitable funding over equal funding for parks. Older neighborhoods with fewer resources should receive the same quality and quantity of parks, recreation facilities and services as newer neighborhoods with more resources. There is a desire to improve park safety, maintenance, facility condition and

YOUTH ART CONTEST

The City of Sacramento's Department of Youth, Parks, and Community Enrichment is updating its Parks and Recreation Master Plan to guide improvements to parks, trails, recreation facilities, and programs over the next 20 years. To inform this new Parks Master Plan 2040, the team launched a youth art contest in summer 2021 to help identify needs and priorities for future policy decisions. The contest creatively engaged youth from all socioeconomic backgrounds in Sacramento through poetry, videos, photos, and drawings, and uncovered impactful stories about their experiences while simultaneously promoting engagement in civic life and building a stronger relationship with YPCE.

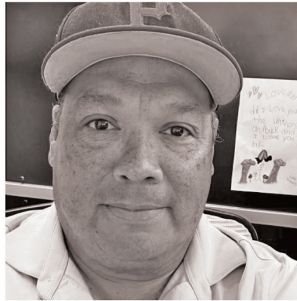

The residents of Sacramento enjoy access to an extensive parks and recreation system that includes more than 4,265 acres of regional, community-wide, and neighborhood facilities. City facilities include 129 neighborhood parks, 56 community parks, 25 Regional/Citywide Specialty Parks, 14 Open Space areas, and 115 miles of shared-use paths. These facilities offer opportunities for exercise and enjoyment that are available to all.

The benefits they provide for social interaction, personal growth, a connection to the natural environment, and wellness is invaluable.

ACCESS FOR ALL!

The City of Sacramento Department of Youth, Parks, and Community Enrichment welcomes people with disabilities into our recreation programs through specialized programs and inclusion opportunities.

NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS

Neighborhood parks range in size and serve a ½ mile radius. Many Neighborhood Parks are located adjacent to elementary schools with amenities oriented toward the recreation needs of children.

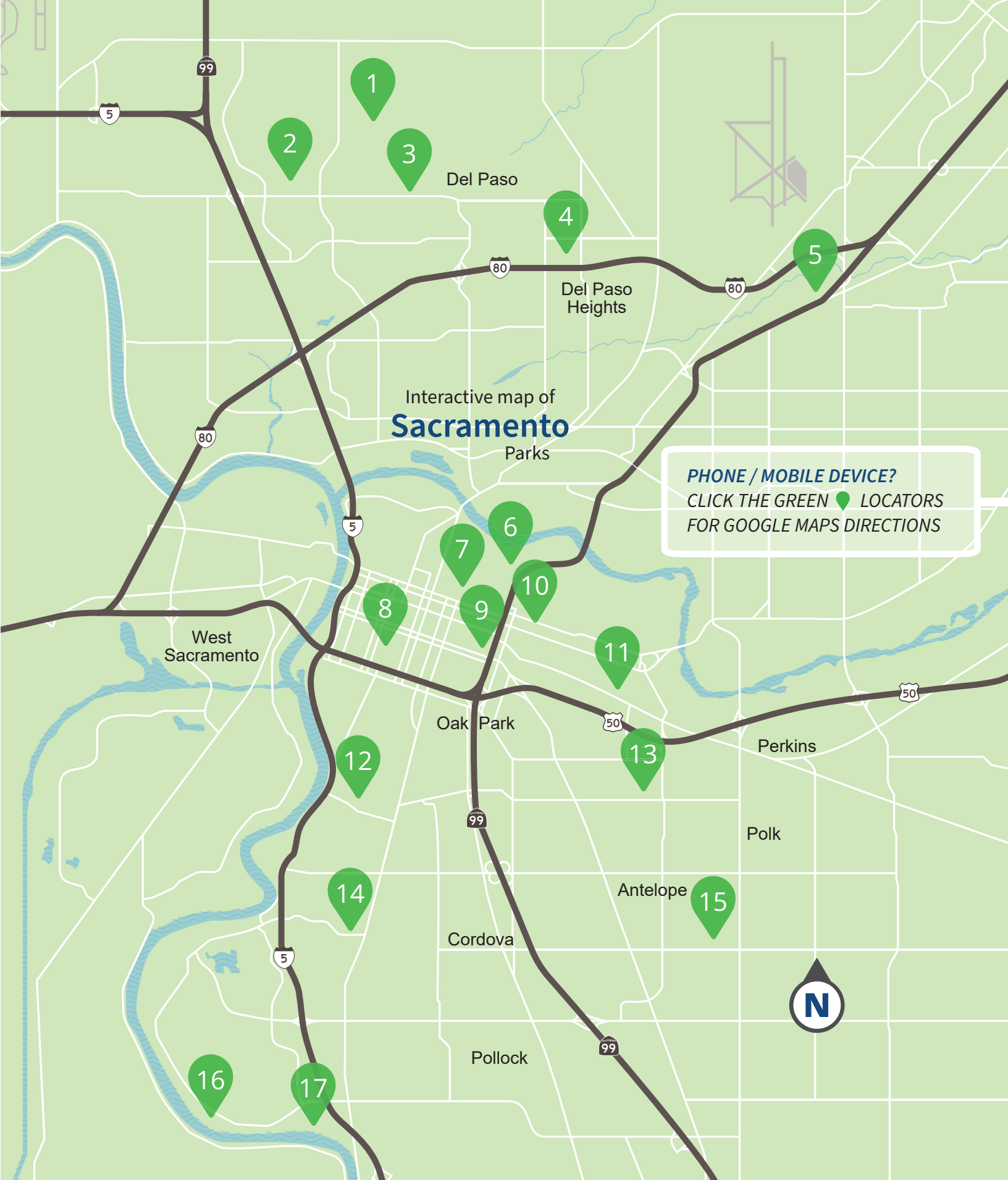
COMMUNITY PARKS

Community parks range in size to serve a 3 mile radius or several neighborhoods. Community Parks contain amenities found in Neighborhood Parks, but may also contain lighted sports fields or courts, skate parks, dog parks, nature areas, and off-street parking and restrooms. Specialized amenities may also be found in Community Parks including community centers, water play areas or swimming pools.


REGIONAL PARKS

Regional parks serve the entire City and may include all the amenities found in Community Parks and also include sports complexes, large scale picnic areas, golf courses, and region-wide attractions.
